The Bay Circuit Trail and Greenway

The focus of the presentation will be The Bay Circuit Trail and Greenway (BCT) along with a brief overview of the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC). The AMC was established in 1876, and is the oldest and largest conservation, recreation, and outdoor education organization in the country.

The AMC is playing a leadership role in the **BAY CIRCUIT ALLIANCE** to improve and complete the BCT. With over four million people in the greater Boston metropolitan area, the BCT is an incredible public outdoor activities resource and destination, but for many area residents it remains a hidden gem. This 230 mile trail arcs around Boston from



Duxbury to Newburyport, and offers close-to-home outdoor recreation. Learn about AMC's work with communities, volunteers, and BCT enthusiasts to build awareness of the trail and to take the BCT to the next level.

Kristen Sykes is Director of Conservation Strategies at the Appalachian Mountain Club and Director of Operations for the Bay Circuit Alliance. She has been at AMC for over 10 years working to advance land protection and trails in the Mid-Atlantic and the Northeast. She has worked on conservation and recreation issues for 20 years and has a M.S. in Environmental Studies from the University of Montana. She is also a Senior Fellow with the Environmental Leadership Program.

This makes us one of the oldest organizations in Massachusetts devoted to the preservation and conservation of open land for the enjoyment of present and future generations. Our merger with the Weston Land Trust in 2011 enhanced that mission and our ability to protect and promote the sustainable use of our town's treasured open space resources. Today, Weston has about 2000 acres of protected conservation land laced with 90 miles of trails that WFTA manages for the enjoyment and use of the public.

The WFTA trustees and I welcome your involvement in preserving this very special and unique asset. The wonderful world of walks in the Weston woods

Our Trustees enjoy using the many trails on Town conservation land, and we asked a few of them to tell about their favorites. Here are three of the best:

Doublet Hill

Did you know the highest point in Weston is on Doublet Hill? It doesn't seem like much of a

hill, but when you climb it from bottom to top it is a significant climb. Of course, the reason for the name Doublet is there are two of these high spots. One is on private property which is about 360 feet above sea level. The house can be spotted when you are exiting the Mass Turnpike onto Route 30 toward Weston. The other is not far away, marked by a fading white X on the large rock face you walk across.



Doublet Hill conservation lands have an area of about 35 acres, separated from

Elliston Woods and Hemlock Pond by the Weston Aqueduct. The long level aqueduct is an easy, sunny path from the beginning of Loring Rd. across Newton Street, all the way to the Ash Street Reservoir.


I enjoy the climb up almost to the top where there is a beautiful view of Boston. On a clear day you can see the Zakim (Bunker Hill) Bridge, as well as a panoramic view of the Boston skyline. Continuing north, the trail gradually turns downward to the top of Doublet Hill Road (where there is parking for cars), then back down through pine woods, stone walls and finally to where I started on Meadowbrook Rd. It's such a peaceful woods so close to civilization, where I can look out at the busy world going by.

Trail Maps and Elmer's Book

Don't miss the new Tricentennial edition of the Weston Forest and Trail Association trail map! Frame it or fold it up and put it in your backpack. Either way, it shows Weston's 2000 acres of conservation land and 90 miles of trails. And Elmer Jones' Walks on Weston Conservation Land is the ideal companion to the town's trail map. Lovingly compiled and written by a noted



naturalist and former WFTA trustee, this primer on our trails and special

places is not to be missed! Both the map and the book are available at Town Hall (upstairs) for \$10 and \$15, respectively.



Sears Land and Cat Rock

Of the 90 miles of trails in Weston, these two walks are my favorites. The first, Sears land, is a quiet, solitary walk. The other, Cat Rock area, is a fun place to meet people and their dogs.



The Sears land and abutting Forbes conservation land off of Church Street make for a quiet, pretty walk through woods and meadows. I often have the entire trail to myself. Three Mile Brook is a lovely place to stop and enjoy the stream tumbling through. The new Lee's Bridge in memory of our longtime Trustee Lee Cohen is a perfect place to linger on a warm afternoon. In the fall ,the sugar maples shine a golden glow along the trail. There is plenty of history here with old mill foundations still showing.

If you follow the trail out to the pond and look across you will find nesting sites for Great Blue Herons. The pond has lots of wildlife and is a good place for bird watching.

My other favorite hike is Cat Rock and "80 Acres", which comprises 130 acres to explore. This is where I go to find what I like to call a "dog party". This is a mellow crowd of people and their dogs enjoying the trails, with the four-footed ones swimming in Hobbs Pond and chasing balls and each other in the big field nearby. People are generally good about picking up after their dogs which is important (and required) since many come to enjoy these trails.



Elmer Jones, in his book "Walks on Weston

Conservation Land", describes both areas as having a variety of habitats that provide food and shelter for wildlife. Both are good areas for bird watching, particularly during migration.

Mount Lemuel

From Doublet Hill, you can see Newton, Boston, the State House, and the Zakim bridge. From

Cat Rock, you can see Route 128 and Waltham. From Sunset Corner, look west to Nobscot Hill, Wayland and Sudbury and sometimes Mount Wachusett.

From Mount Lemuel? Well – when I moved to Weston four decades ago, there was a view of Blue Hill. Now there is a view of an unvisited dell, the chimney of a fallen cabin, and trees, barriers of trees, where I used to see Blue Hill. But I walk there often.

Street Forest: 21 acres of woodland that lies roughly across the street from my house. Not as stunning as Weston's other high points, it is (surprisingly!) higher than Cat Rock and about as tall as the east summit of Doublet Hill. (Sadly, the west summit, the highest point in town, is privately owned.) The bedrock summit of Pine Street Forest is named for Lemuel Smith, a farmer who once owed this tract.



Despite its modest size and limited views, this little forest contains enough trails to occupy me for an hour. If you tire of dog packs encountered at Cat Rock, try Mount Lemuel. I see dog tracks and boot tracks, deer and scarlet tanagers. But I seldom see a person or a dog.


We're trailblazers. Weston has 90 miles of trails, open to hikers, skiers, and horses, but not to motorized vehicles. Our trail map (\$10) can be purchased at Town Hall.

We offer free guided walks. We meet in a different part of town and explore different trails the first Sunday of each month from October through May. All the walks start at 2:00 p.m., and we have socializing and snacks afterwards. There is always a notice of the meeting place in the Town Crier on the Thursday before each Sunday walk and on our website at www.westonforesttrail.org



We prevent you from tripping. We maintain the trails on all of the Town's conservation land. This means that we make sure blowdown trees and debris from snow and ice storms are cleared away to maintain safe access. Your dues help pay for this work.


We plan ahead. The Weston Forest and Trail
Association was formed in 1955 by twelve
founders who understood that the sprawl of
suburban development after World War II would
put immense pressures on semi-rural towns like
Weston. The heart of the organization for many
years was the late Dr. William Elliston, physician,
gentleman farmer and amateur naturalist. A
part of the conservation land (Elliston Woods) is
named in his honor.

Donations and Acquisitions in 2014

Land or easements acquired during 2014 by the Town and WF&TA for conservation purposes:

Received by WF&TA: two trail easements from The Santangelo Love Lane Realty Trust on the property at 84 Love Lane. One of the easements allows a connection with the trails located on the north side of Love Lane with Town owned Conservation Land on the south side of Love Lane. The other easement is a 1.29 acre area that has allowed for a new trail, which has been constructed recently, that avoids a very wet section of the preexisting trail that parallels Buckskin Drive.

Received by the Town of Weston Conservation Commission by a vote at the May 2014 Annual Town Meeting: a 2.8 acre parcel of land located east of Westerly Road upon which three preexisting trails are located. This parcel of land had been taken by the Town for nonpayment of real estate taxes. This 2.8 acre parcel is bounded on the east by Town Conservation Land and on the south and west by Weston Forest and Trail Association trail easementsnts.

The average market value of the Fund in 2014 was \$1,438,273.60. The Cost of Living Index for all Urban Consumers in the Boston Area increased 1.6% during the year ended November 2014. 1.6% of \$1,438,273.60 is \$23,012.38. Real income from the Fund in 2014 is calculated as follows:

> Income and Capital Gains \$ 121,046.28 Less inflation adjustment (23,012.38)

> > Real Income or (loss) \$ 98.033.90

\$98,033.90 is 6.82% of the average market value of the Fund in 2014. The average real rate of return on the Fund starting in 1989 is 3.79%.

During the year we received contributions to the Endowment Fund in the amount of \$61,676.85 of which \$30,000.00 was added to the Endowment Fund and \$31,676.85 has been retained as operating funds.
